





Hello Pals, one and all!

We are working on a fabulous agenda for the 44th Annual Mr. Peanut National Convention.

Annapolis is home to the Naval Academy, is the Capitol of Maryland and since it's founding in 1649, one of the oldest cities on the East Coast. Annapolis was the United States capitol when the Treaty of Paris was signed, ending the Revolutionary War.

Four of the signers of the Declaration of Independence were from Maryland and all 4 had impressive homes in the city, which still stand today.

The State House is where George Washington tendered his resignation of General of the Continental Army and the same offices are used by the Governor and the legislature.

Mr. Peanut Goes to the Smithsonian.

Article in The History Blog. Excerpt:



An inspired the young Amedeo to get a fruit stand of his own with a peanut cart and a cheap roaster that he modified himself from scrapyard parts. He added a steam whistle so his cart would go off like a tea kettle when the roasting was done and an automated stirring mechanism which allowed him to focus on his customers without concern that the

peanuts would burn. Showing an early understanding of marketing that would soon blossom into the dandiest of anthropomorphic peanuts, Obici called himself "The Peanut Specialist" and was soon doing very brisk business from the back of a horse-drawn wagon. By the time he was 18 years old in 1895, Amedeo had saved enough money to bring his mother and siblings to live with him in the United States and still had money left over to buy his own restaurant that specialized in roasted nuts and, weirdly, oyster stew.

Real Items (framed in green, next page)

- 1. Wrapper Cellophane wrapper for "Planters Chocolate P-Nut Bar", a confection which sold for 5 cents. 7" x 5 ¹/₂". 1930's?
- 2. Apron 1980's era blue/white apron for Planters Peanut Oil, with copy written in French (with a little Japanese thrown in at the bottom).
- 3. Radio This is a 1970's plastic transistor radio in the shape of a can. Although similar in style and design to a much more commonly seen can radio (see yellow book, page 32, lower left), this is taller (notice how much blue space is between the graphics and the edge of the radio).
- 4. Decal Made by the American Decal and Mfg. Co, dated February 1972. A 5" x 5" peel away sticker of a Planters metal can.
- 5. Clock This item was last seen in Internet Watch #89 Jan/Feb 2020, and was listed under "Fakes" (#2, page 9) as a paperweight. It is now seen to be a clock with a black plastic digital time display on the front where the windshield is located. Also, I now believe this to be an authentic Planters item.
- 6. Ad 1930's ad cut from a Canadian newspaper, with copy written in French.
- 7. Sign Set of six cardboard signs, featuring a 1950'S style Mr. Peanut and a blank space, on which the current item prices were to be written for the display shelves in the Peanut Stores. $4 \frac{3}{4}$ " x $3 \frac{1}{4}$ ".
- 8. Paper sheet This is a note pad from a Planters factory. The only thing designating it as Planters is the "Planters Print" wording on the lower left. Presumably Planters had an in-house print shop. Interesting item because of the use of the gender specific word "Forelady" where the signature should go, a politically correct touch which was literally about 50 years ahead of its time.
- 9. Plaque 10" x 8 " wooden plaque, for Planters Fresh Roast Peanuts, says "We Made it Happen 1900-91". Presumably an in-house Planters sales team sales or roll-out team award.

Fake Items (framed in red, next page)

- 1. Wooden plaque Mr. Peanut is carved in relief on a piece of wood. 7" x 5".
- Clock face Fake replacement face for the real 1940'S neon store clock (see blue book, page 14, bottom).
- 3. Statue A ceramic hand painted item, stands 7" tall. Marked on the bottom 1990 6 PR (possibly Peanut Pal Phil Redman)?
- 4. Letterhead Old style Mr. Peanut. Basically a piece of paper with text and color graphics. Planters misspelled (there should be no apostrophe).


















All of the items depicted below are from one seller, who indicates they came from a North Carolina estate sale of a person who worked in Planters printing department for many years. This is the same seller whose items were showcased in Internet Watch column #107 (Jan/Feb 2023).

Diecut # 1 – Measure 5" high and 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " across at widest point. The cutout of Mr. Peanut is like the common yellow bookmark. In small print at the bottom of the card is printed "Please insert this in round slot back of wire rack", so we can assume this item was actually meant to be used as a point of sale piece, and was not just a mock –up. The font of the "Planters Peanuts" is rather unusual.

Diecut # 2 – Measures 7" wide and 4" high. Copy reads "Planters 5 ¢ Fresh! Fresh! They hit the spot". Possibly meant to be used on a wire rack as per the item above?

Peanut Oil display –A can of Ali D'Italia peanut oil and the metal deep fryer basket could be purchased for a combined sale price to be written into the circles to the right. Would have been given out by the sales team for store display. Measures approximately 11" x 14".

Popcorn oil display – Another store display item, this one for Planters Popcorn Oil. A bottle of the oil could be placed in a cutout at the bottom of the display and popping corn could also be attached by rubber band to the right. Folding flanges on the back of the item indicate it was designed to stand up on a counter as a point of purchase piece.

Banquet Program – Program for Tuesday July 9. 1946 7 PM of the Planters Midsummer Sales Convention (Southern Division) banquet, held at the Planters Club in Suffolk Virginia. Inside is the banquet menu, including "Spaghetti alla Planters Club"), agenda and a list of attendees. Notable is that both Mr. Obici and Mr. Peruzzi made remarks to the group.


Holiday Stationary – Three different pieces of stationary with Christmas themes, from the Suffolk VA office.

Wrapper – This wrapper once held the Planters Jigsaw Bar. There is no indication on the wrapper what ingredients were in a Jigsaw Bar. The hook seemed to be that there was "A Picture Puzzle Free With Every Bar" and "A Large Assortment of Puzzles Packed in Every Box". The bar weight was 3 ³/₄ ounces and sold for five cents. The picture seems to show two wrappers, one unfolded and the other folded. I am not familiar with this confection, and it is unclear to me whether this was a concept piece or actually was in production. I am curious if other Peanut Pals have ever come across mention of this confection in their collection.

Toast Cracker Label – A round label that wound have been affixed to a cellophane wrapper that once contained peanut butter cracker sandwiches.

Soap Powder Box – Probably the most unusual item in the lot was this orange box for one pound of Planters All Purpose Soap Powder, another item I have never heard of in any other context. I'm not sure why Planters would have gotten into the Soap Powder business. Typically when Planters sold non-edible products they were a by-product of manufacturing, for example the Dixie Litter chicken coop bedding made from crushed peanut shells. This box is unfolded. Again, please let your fellow Peanut Pals know if you have heard of this product before and in what context.

Lent Display – This was for the sales force to distribute to their customers so they would hang it in their windows. Measures 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 12 $\frac{1}{4}$ " and features an image of the aviatrix die-cut box. These were printed specifically for the Lent season peanut sales push , when many Catholics would give up meat for Lent and so would consume peanuts as an alternate protein source.





Christmas ornament 2023 new with tag. Stands 4 $^{1\!/\!2}$ ". Hard to find as it was not widely distributed. \$20.


